Pupil Premium Grant Statement

Background

The pupil premium is allocated to schools in respect of children from low income families who are currently known to be eligible for Free School Meals (FSM) and children who have been looked after continuously for more than six months.

Schools are free to spend the Pupil Premium as they see fit to "close the gap" between children from disadvantaged circumstances and those above the low-income threshold.

It is not linked to a specific child, but is to be used for overall impact. However, we are held accountable for how we have used the additional funding to support pupils from low-income families.

Impact summary

Primrose Hill continues to work hard to close the gap between the attendance and achievement of children on Free School Meals and children who are looked after. The gap is narrowing for children attaining level 4 and above in English and mathematics at key stage 2.

Impact Summary

The pupil premium children achieved significantly better results in the following:

- 2015 Writing 82% achieved a Level 4 or above, compared to 65% in 2014
- 2015 Maths 65% achieved a Level 4 or above, compared to 60% in 2014
- 2015 combined 59% achieved a Level 4 or above, compared to 45% in 2014

Reading was marginally lower with 76% achieving the level 4 or above this year, compared to 80% last year.

In year 2 the results were the following: Reading - average progress of PP children 4.3 APS 86% of PP children achieved a 2b or above, compared with 80% of non pp children

Writing - average progress of PP children 4.24 APS 81% of PP children achieved a 2b or above, compared with 60% of non pp children

Maths - average progress of PP children 3.95 APS 86% of PP children achieved a 2b or above, compared with 75% of non pp children
